From the Director



Librarians are usually helpful people, that's why we choose this profession. Our first inclination is sometimes to jump in

to help someone we think needs help. But have you ever thought about asking first? It might seem like a small thing, but it can make a big difference.

When you ask someone if they need help, you show respect for their ability to handle things on their own. This simple question can prevent them from feeling overwhelmed or frustrated by unsolicited help. Plus, it opens up a conversation where they can tell you exactly what they need. This way, your help is more likely to be useful and appreciated.

Asking before helping also builds mutual respect and understanding. It shows that you value their opinion and are willing to listen. This can strengthen your relationships

and build trust. In a work setting, this approach can improve teamwork and make the environment more positive and productive.

Not everyone wants or needs help all the time. By asking first, you give them the chance to say no politely, without feeling pressured. This respect for their choice can boost their confidence and independence, making them feel more capable of handling things on their own.

Also, make sure your policies and procedures don't take away opportunities to have these discussions with your patrons. Sometimes in our rush to solve problems, we forget to talk with the person who would be impacted the most by the solution.

So, next time you see someone who might need help, take a moment to ask first. You might find that your help is more welcome and effective. It's a simple thing that can lead to better results and a better relationship with your patrons.

Our May CASTL was held via Zoom due to the busy time of year. It covered the topic of "Policies for the Use of Library Space" and dealt mainly with the usage of meeting rooms.

We found that library spaces are very popular, and it is hard to know what exactly people may expect the library to be able to host. We even had one case where there was a desire to establish a mostly permanent office in a library!

It can also occur that someone reserves a room for an event and their advertising gives the location of the program as the library, but it doesn't name the sponsor. Then it may appear that the event is library-sponsored. This can be partially solved by policies requiring those reserving meeting rooms to not advertise in a way that suggests events or meetings are sponsored by the library. It is even possible to have them explicitly agree to that condition (for example, by checking a box on a paper or online meeting room application). While this does not guarantee that people will follow the policy, it gives a basis on which to correct meeting room users.

Libraries differ on whom they allow to use meeting rooms. Some only allow use by the library and by non-profit organizations. Others also allow commercial and personal use, although they may require deposits and/or charge fees for those types of use. Sometimes a group will give a donation as a "thank you." Some of our libraries also state in their policy that the library has the right to, if necessary, bump a group in order to hold a library program or event.

We also discussed the pros and cons of having a time buffer between groups using meeting rooms. If there is a buffer, then a group that goes a few minutes long or needs time to clean up can have it. However, time buffers also reduce the overall amount of meeting room time available and may somewhat limit the number of groups who can use the meeting room(s).

Finally, <u>SELS</u> has a few meeting room policy examples on its website.

- Preconference fees



NLC Book Club Spotlight – Room

As a college freshman, Ma was abducted and locked in a shed for 7 years. Despondent in her confinement, it's not until her son is born that Ma is renewed and dedicates her life not only to their escape but to providing the naïve Jack with a full and healthy life, unaware that he is in captivity. Inspired by the real-life determination of mothers and women in the face of impossible circumstances, *Room* is the winner of the Alex Award, a New York Times Best Book of the Year, and 2010's Irish Novel of the Year.

In the Room, Jack and Ma play, learn, brush their teeth, exercise, and look out Skylight. Every night, he goes to sleep in Wardrobe while a mysterious man comes to visit. Ma doesn't seem to like Old Nick, but Jack likes it when he brings them new things like clothes, food, and sometimes candy! To Jack, Room is all there is, and he wants everything to stay the same forever. But now that Jack is 5 years old, his curiosity is harder to contain, he gets in fights with Ma, and Old Nick gets so upset that their power is off for days! Maybe he should have just stayed 4. Ma is changing too.



She decides it's time to tell Jack a story, a real story this time, about a place called Outside. And about a plan where Jack must be brave, get to Outside, and save Ma.

From discussing faith, the sensationalism of tragedy, and the spirit of motherhood, love is at the forefront of this novel. Narrated by Jack's unusual and childish voice, *Room's* language will take a second to get used to and is not for everyone. We follow his malleable young mind as it opens up and tries to process this place that was previously far beyond his understanding. But once the reader is enveloped in his unique world, it's hard to leave and return to Outside.

Room was adapted by Emma Donoghue into <u>an academy award winning movie of the same name</u> starring Brie Larson and Jacob Tremblay.

Section 51-212 of the Nebraska State Statutes

states that library use is "subject always to such reasonable regulations as the library board may adopt to render such library of the greatest use to the inhabitants of the city, village, county, or township. The board may exclude from the use of the library and reading rooms any person who willfully violates or refuses to comply with rules and regulations established for the government thereof."
