POKEMON GO AND YOU

Why is there an article about Pokémon in the TRaiLS newsletter? Well, I'm sure you know that the new phone game, Pokémon Go, has taken the world by storm. If you have no idea what Pokémon is... I'm sorry! I think Pokémon is AWESOME, and you wouldn't believe how excited I was when I was asked to write this article. Basically, there's these pocket monsters (Pocke+mon = Pokémon) running about the world, and the goal of every Pokémon trainer is to "catch 'em all". The show came out when I was about six years old, and let me tell you, it was a huge dream of mine to BE a Pokémon trainer.

And now, that dream is coming true for millions. The Pokémon Go app uses your phone's GPS and tracks you in real time, so you can go out and explore as you play. It ties in real parks, bodies of water, etc. into gameplay. Your whole town is mapped out on the app, and historical/artistic landmarks are made into PokeStops and others, like my library, are made into Pokémon Gyms. The goal is to walk around as much as possible to catch Pokémon.

But Liz, I don't know what any of that means! Well, that's why I've been asked to write this article, so you can help out patrons who are new to the game! To start, players have to sign in with Google or join the Pokémon Trainer Club. Then they get to choose an avatar, name it, and dress it up. The game will start up then, but sometimes they'll have to walk outside to kick start it into working. Immediately, three Pokémon

By Elizabeth Hittle, aka Liz the Librarian, will appear, because they need to choose a starter. Then the walking begins! Their phone will vibrate when a Pokémon is close by. Then all they have to do is keep walking towards it, and when they encounter it their camera will turn on. The next step, of course, is to catch said Pokémon, and players do that by tossing pokeballs into the green ring that appears over it. If they've caught the Pokémon, the pokeball will shake three times and then sparkle.

> PokeStops are locations for players to get items, pokeballs, and eggs to hatch. They refresh every five minutes, so players can sit and farm for items for as long as they want to. Pokémon Gyms can only be accessed after the player has reached level five, and then they will be prompted to choose a team: yellow for Instinct, blue for Mystic, and red for Valor. Gyms are controlled by one team at a time, and if the gym is controlled by the player's team, they can register and train their Pokémon there. If the gym is controlled by another team, the player can battle against the gym to try and gain

> People who have never exercised before are now getting plenty of it because of the game. Players are already losing weight and becoming more active, and they can't get enough of it! People are also socializing way more than they ever did, bonding with strangers over the game. It's also making people learn about the metric system, since it uses kilometers instead of miles, and you have to walk so many kilometers (two, five, or ten) to hatch eggs. So many people are playing that the servers have gone down quite a bit, but the developers are working

Lunch was a fun fieldtrip to Mama's and Nana's in downtown Neligh (their fries are delicious!). Eighteen librarians were in attendance for the morning sessions.

Pokémon Go also has business booming for thousands of people. You can now be hired as a Pokémon Go driver to chauffer players around! Businesses have set up sales based around the game, and even set out lures to attract more Pokémon to their location, which in turn attracts more customers. We've put up signs at my library to advertise that we're a gym and are welcoming players to come in and catch Pokémon!

Be sure to tell your patrons that they can sign up for Charity Miles, a non-profit organization, whose app donates money for every mile walked as you play. There's also Woof Trax, which donates to a rescue of your choice in exchange for your walking time. Many shelters are also offering for people to walk their dogs while people are playing. This has led to a huge increase in adoptions, and there are even shelters that are having to borrow animals from other places because all of their animals have been adopted, all

thanks to the publicity of this game.



All the programs began with safety talks but each branch had their own spin on the Pokémon Safari. The Florence Branch had their safari in conjunction with their *Safe*, *Fit*, *and Fun Day* with the community center they share the building with, while an Omaha Police Officer led the safety talk. At the Millard Branch there was water and granola bars for the Pokémon hunters as well as drawings for a Pokémon book, backpack, and ITunes gift card.




Snyder's Summer Reading
