Partnerships are Valuable!

With the coming of fall, the library world is at a stage where many things reboot. Academic libraries and school libraries are starting new school years, hopefully with renewed goals and enthusiasm. Public libraries have completed summer reading programs and are preparing to embrace the next challenges.

This may be the perfect opportunity to evaluate the partnerships that your library has with other entities. Are there some potential volunteers that would be valuable resources? Would some local businesses be willing to support programming? There are some businesses that offer regular grants to nonprofit organizations. School librarians and public librarians can work together toward mutual goals that can benefit students and families.

Take some time to reflect on your community and try to see it with fresh eyes. Are there any new businesses that you could work with? Are there some organizations that would benefit from the library's help? For example, libraries and food pantries could work well together to help families. Just having their information available in the library that can help spread the word to families in need could be helpful. There are obvious partnerships, such as the senior center, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and school systems.

Some community organizations rely on fundraising to help supplement their budgets. Could the library work with the local fire department, Lion's Club, American Legion, or others with fundraising projects that could benefit everyone? Building these relationships benefits everyone involved, sometimes in unique and unexpected ways.

If you see someone in your community with similar goals as the library, try not to see it as a competition. Try to figure out a way that the library can work with them. Is someone providing afterschool activities for the children in the community? Perhaps the library could help in some way, or maybe they could do activities in the library occasionally. Does the senior center offer services or programs that are similar to those the library provides? Suggest that the library host an event at the senior center or invite the senior center to use the library for their activities. Does a local museum have an interesting display? Find some relevant books on the topic and join in the fun!

Do not get frustrated if these relationships do not magically develop. They do take work and perseverance. Everyone is busy, and they may not recognize the value that the library can provide. Keep trying to build connections, and try not to get discouraged or take things personally if they do not evolve as you had hoped.

On the other hand, express your appreciation for those successful partnerships! Make sure that you let others know how much you value them, whether it is the library giving or receiving the help. A short thank you note can make a decisive impact. Librarians are creative, positive thinkers!

Book Club Spotlight:

Why I'm an Only Child & Other Slightly Naughty Plains Folktales

Mackenzie Marrow is the librarian in charge of book clubs at the Nebraska Library Commission and wants to share with everyone the hidden gems in the [NLC's Book Club Collection](#). Below is an excerpt, but to read the full details go to [Mackenzie's blog post](#).

Why I'm an Only Child is the vehicle for Welsch to define the specific type of midwestern humor he has coined "Civil Ribaldry." In his own words: "These jokes take the form of extraordinarily subtle, distinctly rural narratives. While there is a punchline, unlike the riddling joke, for example, "civil ribaldry" does contain a clear narrative element. The stories, while slightly off-color, can be, and are, told in mixed company, even with children present, without much danger of being understood by the innocent" (Citation). According to Welsch, the oral tradition is an essential aspect of Civil Ribaldry and it tends to be more of a performance than a joke. This form of rural wit is not something to perfect or concoct; it is simply having the talent for timing and a flair for diction and detail when the moment presents itself. Welsch discusses its relationship to other forms of wit and verbal jousting, such as the Black American game of "Dozens," and asserts their value as linguistic American traditions.

North Bend Public Library's Budget Friendly Activities

The North Bend Public Library offers a fun, budget friendly and timeless passive program for our younger patrons. Felt Mr. and Mrs. Potato Head are available daily for our young patrons to dress up and accessorize. One of our librarians that passed away in 2018 created this for our little patrons. The potatoes are about 2 ft tall and 1ft across. They have Halloween costumes, outfits in our school colors, pom-poms, all sorts of hats and shoes to go with each outfit. Outfits for holidays, a pet dog, different sets of eyeballs and sunglasses, too. After the potatoes are decorated, we leave them decorated for the next person to change or add to the display. The background is a rolling board about 3 feet tall by 4 feet wide. It was very inexpensive to make and our little patrons use it every day. We keep this in the main room of the library for everyone to enjoy.

During the summer months we set out cutup pool noodles and toothpicks for kids to design and create whatever their heart desires. Then, we set out the creations for a couple of weeks, take them down a few at a time and the circle of creativity continues. We cut the noodles in 1/2" to 1" pieces for the most part, some of them are 4"-5". All colors, shapes and sizes of noodles are used and mixed together. This time of year the noodles are on sale, so that is a cost savings for us. The kids really are very creative, we have a toilet, bird, bridges, birthday cakes, glasses, an airplane and more. I just thought I would share a couple of inexpensive but tested and true passive programs we have at our library.

Humanities Program: Dan Holtz

Verdigre Public Library appreciated TRLS for funding our Humanities performer in April 2022. The following describes Dan Holtz's excellent show which the audience thoroughly enjoyed.

The hardy souls who ventured out in last Thursday's wind to attend a Humanities Nebraska program at Verdigre Public Library got a treat. Dan Holtz, of Nebraska City, provided excellent entertainment while teaching of inspiring figures from Nebraska history.

His program, "Nebraska Through Song and Story" composed mostly of original songs plus a few folk songs, commemorated soddy-house homesteaders on government claims, photographer Solomon Butcher who never quite succeeded during his career, cantankerous immigrant Jules Sandoz, the decimation of the Plains buffalo herds, hard-working Dr. Susan LaFleche Picotte--first Native American M.D. either male or female, Chief Standing Bear's huge personal losses endured while bridging the divide between Native and white Americans, Robert Ball Anderson--one of the first African-American landowners in western Nebraska, the tremendous volunteer-run North Platte canteen during World War II and, finally, crackerjack aviatrix Evelyn Sharp from Ord who died tragically young at 24.

Touching titles included, "Coffee, Sandwiches and Love", "The Sky is No Limit", "The One Who Had the Dream", "What's it Mean to be a Man?" and "Homeward the Arrows Fly". Dan donated one of his CDs to the library which is available for check-out.

Dan Holtz grew up in Ord and is a retired professor of English, including Nebraska Literature, from Peru State College. He has written thirty-five songs about Nebraska history and has truly enjoyed criss-crossing our state for twenty-six years as a Humanities Nebraska performer. His wife, originally from Elgin, also is a retired college professor and said she's related to all the Heithoffs and Schindlers.

Dan's finale was the origin tale and singing of our state song, "Beautiful Nebraska", which found many of the audience singing along with shining eyes.
