

New York Philharmonic. It has become one of Hovhaness' most loved and famous compositions. Hovhaness incorporated vocalizations by actual humpback whales from a recording by Roger Payne. The first whale vocalizations begin at clip 2:55. The work has been credited as one of the early attempts by many artists to save whales from extinction. The spectacular pictures in the background provide a feeling that you are one with the whales.

A limited number of <u>Creative Aging through the Arts Program (CAAP)</u> grants are still available for artist-led workshops at non-profits, libraries, and other local government agencies serving older adults in Nebraska. Library Partners for for Mental Health Awareness Month

A letter from Terri Haynes, ESU 13.

"As you know, libraries are often a 'go to' place for many community members. Some visit for ordinary reasons such as to find a good book to read or find some research on a topic of interest. Others may come by for some form of comfort such as warmth or social interaction.

Each May is Mental Health Awareness Month. It is a great time to promote wellness to your communities. Libraries are a great community partner to promote wellness information.

You can do this with some of our no cost ideas or ideas with some modest costs.

Following is a list of ideas you can use within your libraries and even partner with some community organizations or patrons.

NO COST LIBRARY IDEAS:

- 1. Showcase books, movies, materials that promote physical and mental health for adults.
- 2. Showcase books, movies, materials that promote good character building for your youth.
- 3. Use character building books for your children's programs
- 4. Create a bibliotherapy collection from your resources.

- 5. Use the color green during May. Green is the color used to bring awareness to mental health.
- 6. Promote mental wellness on your social media accounts.
- 7. Display flyers regarding mental wellness
- 8. Display calming digital visual or audio pieces. Such as an animal cam, tropical fish tank for video and audio can be some instrumental music such as flute or harp music or singing bowls.
- 9. Download this free Toolkit from Mental Health America (MHA): There is a quick form to complete to receive the download. **Toolkit Download:**

NO COST COMMUNITY IDEAS:

- 1. Ask to make proclamations at your City Council meetings, County Commission meeting and School Board meetings. (there is a sample proclamation in the MHA Toolkit)
- 2. Ask a mental health provider to join you on your local radio or TV show to promote the activities and your library. You could also make a podcast or social media recording.
- 3. Hold a Mental Health Awareness Walk. Tip: Coordinate the walk with one of the proclamations. Example: Wear green clothing or add green ribbons. Walk to City Hall from a designated area and arrive in time to conduct the proclamation.



- 4. Use some of the articles or social media to promote wellness in your local newsletters, newspapers or radio.
- 5. Ask community business to promote mental wellness on their digital signs. Your local Chamber may be able to help with this as well.

LOW COST IDEAS:

- 1. Change your exterior light bulbs to green bulbs to honor May as Mental Health Awareness Month
- 2. Give out sidewalk chalk to children to display some positive messaging or pictures on their sidewalks or the library sidewalks.

IDEAS NEEDING FUNDS:

1. Light up a community landmark with green bulbs

Examples: Chimney Rock is illuminated in green during May. C-Hill at Chadron is illuminated with green solar lights (the solar light globes have been painted green). County court houses can use green exterior bulbs.

- 2. Increase your library inventory on materials promoting mental health awareness.
- 3. Create a calm corner with sensory tools. Sensory tools can be: silicone sponges, glitter wands, fidgets, etc.
- 4. Sensory furnishings: standup desks with pedals or climbers; pedals to add to stationary furniture, wobble stools or wobble boards, etc.

Nebraska Public Notices <u>Database</u> what are public notices?

Public notices are notifications to taxpayers and citizens, as established by state statutes or by order of a court. They are also sometimes referred to as "legal notices."

WHY ARE THEY PUBLISHED IN NEWSPAPERS OF 'GENERAL CIRCULATION'?

Public notices must be actively disseminated to taxpayers and citizens who may be affected by the information contained in the notice. All government records are intended to be open and "available," but only if people know where to search. The information in public notices is so essential to an informed citizenry that it needs to be published and made available where people will find it. When notices are published in newspapers, they are also then posted onto the internet. states require that taxpayers and citizens be legally notified through public notices in newspapers of the activities of their government entities and courts. In Nebraska, that includes information pertaining to notice of meetings, proceedings or minutes of meetings, elections, annexations, budgets, property taxes and hearings, delinquent payments, hearings, ordinances, foreclosures and many other vital official matters of government entities; for courts, examples of required public notices include filings of estates, law suits, dissolutions, custody, assumed names, foreclosures, and many others.



During 2022, join fellow Nebraskans by reading and discussing The Bones of Paradise: A Novel (William Morrow, 2016). The novel was written by Jonis Agee, a native Nebraskan and was selected for the 2022 One Book One Nebraska.

The press release announcing the selection stated "The Bones of Paradise" is a multigenerational family saga set in the unforgiving Nebraska Sand Hills in the years following the massacre at Wounded Knee—it is an ambitious tale of history, vengeance, race, guilt, betrayal, family, and belonging, filled with a vivid cast of characters shaped by violence, love, and a desperate loyalty to the land. The One Book One Nebraska selection committee enjoyed the intricate plot development and well developed characters. They felt that the novel was a compelling read and contained a variety of themes that would engage discussion on a number of topics. Jonis Agee is an award-winning author of twelve books. Her awards include the John Gardner Fiction Award, the George Garrett Award, a National Endowment for the Arts grant in



fiction, a Loft-McKnight Award, a Loft-McKnight Award of Distinction, and two Nebraska Book Awards.

A native of Nebraska, Agee teaches at the University of Nebraska–Lincoln.

Libraries across Nebraska will join other literary and cultural organizations in planning book discussions, activities, and events that will encourage Nebraskans to read and discuss this book.
