Featured Library: Mary Lanning Hospital Library

Do you need to know what the symptoms and treatment are for West Nile? Are you a nursing student who has to write a research paper? Are you searching for a treatment for a patient with symptoms you can't explain? Ella Rathod is the librarian who helps find the answers for questions like these. Ella has worked for Mary Lanning Hospital Library for the past six years. Ella serves doctors and nurses employed by the hospital and students who attend Mary Lanning. They have about 65 students in Creighton University School of Nursing—Mary Lanning Campus and Mary Lanning Memorial Hospital School of Radiologic Technology. Mary Lanning also has satellite sites in Holdrege and Kearney.

When Ella does a search she goes to databases such as *Science Direct, Ebsco Nursing, Cochrane Library,* or *eMedicine*. She usually gives the Doctors pages of abstracts and they return them to



her with the articles or information they would like to read. Sometimes. when a search is really complicated she sends out a request on DOCLINE

Featured Library: Mary Lanning Hospital Library

which is run by the National Library of Medicine. The amount of medical literature is doubling every five years and doctors and nurses cannot keep up. The library provides a much needed service for the doctors, nurses, students and patients.

Mary Lanning is one of the few out-state hospitals with a library and librarian. Ella provides the physicians' lounge with physician related books and journals. The main library is primarily for the nursing students although physicians, nurses, and patients

use it also. Ella provides large print books for the patient floor where elderly patients usually are residents, and consumer education, consumer health. and fiction for other floors. The children's floor has many children's books which may go home with the patient. Volunteers, on occasion, take a cart of books for patients to make selections. One time a book was returned from the Chicago airport, by a person who said they wanted to finish the book so took it. with them. Ella says she is a scavenger. She buys used books and fiction on sale.



Basically, she buys anything she thinks patients might like.

When school starts, Ella does a basic orientation for the new students. She also has a 55 Plus program on basic computer skills. They meet for three sessions of two hours each. The "students" who have to be over 55, learn MSWord, Internet, especially consumer health sites, and e-mail. She charges \$10.00 for the class and has a long waiting list. Ella tries to give the class three or four times a year.

Last year Ella got a \$6000.00 grant from the National Library of Medicine. With the money, she bought six PDAs for faculty and students to use and become technologically up–to-date. Whole medical reference books can be downloaded to the PDA. The

In 1998, Library Journal named her Fiction Reviewer of the Year. Many of us also know Nancy as the model for the Librarian Action Figure. Nancy will give a talk entitled "The Pleasures and Perils of a Life of Reading." Nancy will talk about her relationship to reading, how she came to write Book Lust and More Book Lust, and some of the perils she's discovered in her love affair with books. Along the way she will, of course, be recommending some good books to read.

Jamie LaRue, An Offer They Can't Refuse: Community Based Librarianship

The Fall Colloquium was held at the Cornhusker Hotel in Lincoln, NE on September 14. The speaker was Jamie LaRue, Director of Douglas County Libraries near Denver, CO. What a great evening it was. Mr. LaRue took Douglas County Libraries from the bottom in every measurable category, to one of the top three libraries in every category. He did this through research and his understanding about the marketing of libraries. He did this by realizing that most of the questioning about the library was directed to the men in the community and women were 79% of his patrons. LaRue says "Women are the brokers of culture in society:" (We all knew that, didn't we?) So he started surveying and questioning the women.

Some of the highlights of his talk were:

If you open the doors of the library and provide good hours and service you will get 35 to 50% of the market. If you have good public relations and well thought out and well done promotion you will increase your usage by 5 to 15%. If you market the library using surveys, focus groups and community relations you will increase another 5 to 15%. If you leave the library and become involved with the community and are visible you will have a successful library which reaches 95% of the community.

People see libraries as a public good, but in today's world they like to see a return on their investment.

He ended with 3 points:

Show up.

Pay attention.

Keep in touch.

After hearing Jamie LaRue speak, I could understand why his libraries have achieved the excellence they have. I would highly recommend going to a workshop given by Jamie LaRue if you have the opportunity.

Open Meetings Law

On July 26, I attended a meeting concerning the Open Meetings Law Act. It was given by John Spatz, who is Legal Counsel for the Nebraska Association of School Boards. There has been a change in the Open Meetings Law Act. Here are some of the points he emphasized in his presentation.

Only a "Public Body" is subject to the Open Meetings Law. (Most Library Boards would be subject to the Open Meetings Law)

An agenda must be posted in a public place prior to the meeting. Some examples are the agenda can be posted on the post office door, the library door, the school, or in the newspaper. This agenda should be posted a reasonable time before the meeting. Mr. Spatz recommended posting the agenda at least 48 hours before the meeting and the "agenda items shall be sufficiently descriptive to give the public reasonable notice of the matters to be considered at the meeting". (Agenda items like "personnel" may not be specific enough. You may have to say "accept resignations of staff")

One copy of the Open Meetings Act shall be posted in the meeting room accessible to members of the public. At the beginning of the meeting, the public must be informed as to the location of the Open Meetings Act. (You can obtain copies from your city clerk)

A sub-committee "may not hold hearings, make policy or take formal action". A sub-committee cannot have a quorum of board members. (If you have 6 members on your board, you cannot have 4 members in a sub-committee)

Any gathering of a quorum of the board is a meeting unless it is a chance meeting or traveling to attend a convention or workshop.

You cannot list the names of the public, who attend the meeting, but the public has the right to speak, and the public must be accommodated. The public must be able to hear. The board can create reasonable rules for public participation, but they must be available to the public.



The most significant change in LB 898 is "it shall not be a defense that the citizen attended the meeting and failed to object at such time". The citizen has 120 days after the meeting and if the court finds that the open meetings law was violated, any decisions that were made will be void. If there is a substantial violation, the citizen can bring suit between 120 days and 1 year.

In keeping with the idea that **library advocacy** is a good thing to do on a continuing basis in order to keep the importance of local public libraries foremost in communities, the Nebraska Library Commission has committed resources to provide membership for all of Nebraska's 273 public libraries in this worthwhile organization.

Many of you have already received an e-mail from Beth Nawalinksi, FOLUSA's Marketing and Public Relations Coordinator, in which she points out the benefits of belonging to FOLUSA. These include:

- Membership beginning October 1, 2006
- Four copies of the newsletter, *News Update*, which is chock-full of ideas for Friends Groups (Please get to FOLUSA the four names of people who will be receiving these newsletters as soon as you can.)
- A "members-only" section of the FOLUSA website with good ideas for Friends, trustees, foundations and libraries themselves on fund-raising, advocacy, etc.

A copy of *Making Our Voices Heard: Citizens Speak Out for Libraries* containing practical advocacy ideas to tell your library's story

The decision to provide membership to all of Nebraska's public libraries is in keeping with recent efforts including:

- Workshops sponsored by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation
- The production of fact sheets of interest to libraries and board members

The revision of the Nebraska Library Board Manual in conjunction with the TUFS Section of NLA (with meetings for input, and the unveiling of the new manual at this year's NLA/NEMA Annual Conference in Omaha)

So this FOLUSA membership is another piece of that very important need to tell the story of your library's importance – continually. We hope every Nebraska public library will use this membership for your local efforts to do this. Please let us know if you have any questions concerning this.
