

Answers to Your Questions

Who developed and updated the Smart Investing @ your Library[®] Curriculum?

The Smart Investing @ your Library[®] training was originally developed by Iowa State University Extension for the Iowa State Library Smart Investing@your Library[®] grant. It was modified and updated (in part) by the Nebraska Library Commission and is now housed on the Nebraska Library Commission’s website, at <http://financialed.nebraska.gov/>. The readings were also updated using the latest versions from www.finrafoundation.org. The videos and the mini-lectures (PowerPoint slides with voice over) were not updated.

How do I access the free online Smart Investing @ your Library[®] class?

To access the class, please see page 3 of this document. Page 4 provides additional tips on navigating the curriculum. Pages 5 and 6 include a handy table of contents grid that you can use to check-off your progress. This grid helps you remember which activities and readings you have completed so that you can easily pick up where you left off when you return to the curriculum.

Are you sure this was updated (I see references to Iowa and to 2013 classes)?

Although you will hear and see references to Iowa agency and programs in the videos and mini lectures, the balance of the curriculum and the links have been updated to be specific to Nebraska agencies and programs. If you are looking for a Nebraska agency and cannot find what you are looking for, we will be happy to direct you. Just click on the project’s “contact,” JoAnn McManus in the upper left hand corner of your screen.

Should I be concerned about the minimum computer requirements before I start making my way through the curriculum?

We generally advise participants that they needn’t worry about the minimum computer requirements unless they are experiencing issues such as viewing a video or participating in one of the Flash-based self-tests. If you do experience issues, we suggest you review the minimum computer requirements to see what might be the issue. (You might need to download a more recent version of Adobe Reader for instance.) If you still experience issues, feel free to use the public access computers at your local public library.

What’s the catch to this “free” class? Is someone trying to sell me something?

There’s no catch, and there is nothing for sale. The Nebraska Library Commission (a Nebraska state agency) and the Northeast Library System (now Three Rivers Library System) received a grant from the American Library Association and the FINRA Investor Education Foundation to

provide unbiased financial literacy training at 22 libraries across Nebraska. Although the formal training (which included live sessions in the library) is concluded, the online training is still available and is now being offered to all Nebraskans through this online-only, self-directed learning opportunity.

What do I do if I have trouble logging on to the system, misplace my password, or experience navigational issues?

You said there are three curriculum options but I only see one when I am online?

There are three curriculum options, as follows:

- Starting Out: Establishing an Investment Plan -- Gen X, Ages 20-40
- Building Up: Fine-tuning your portfolio & planning for retirement -- Pre-Retirees
- Making It Last: Retiring & Retirees – Retirees and those retiring in the next two years

You will only see the **one option** that you signed up for to avoid confusion. The majority of the readings are included in all three options.


The course tutorial video in the class says this is a four week course. Is that all the time I have to complete the class?

The course is organized in four units entitled Week 1, Week 2, etc. You'll see all four units online when you enter the course. The online course is self-paced so take as much time as you need to complete the course.

If I have a financial question, is there anyone available at the Nebraska Library Commission I can direct a question?

Nebraska Library Commission staff can certainly help with technical questions about using the curriculum.
