## From the Director



Back in April I wrote about marking and labeling your books, specifically about potential decisions for how to implement call numbers, genre markings, or other identifiers. I want to add a

little bit more to that discussion now, especially as I have visited many new librarians recently and have seen their reactions to the systems they inherited.

First and foremost is to put your system, whatever it is, in writing. Eventually, someone new will take over the task of handling the collection. It would also be helpful to write down why these decisions were made as well. There has been more than one occasion over the past few months where I had to help decipher what the various abbreviations, color coding, or other book markings meant to a new librarian who didn't have the benefit of having their predecessor around to explain what they all meant.

This is also helpful when deciding to split up a collection into subgroups, like genre sections or by topic. What guidance do you give to another person to help them figure out where a book may be located? For example: some of our libraries

have a "Nebraska" section. What does that entail?

You also need to be consistent in the usage, mainly so new staff and customers aren't confused. There was a collection recently I helped with that used 4 different abbreviations on the spine label for books that all went into the same section. 4 different ways of marking the same thing.

This isn't to discourage your use of marking and labeling to help people have a better idea of what a book is about, but for it to continue to be useful for customers, volunteers, and new staff now and in the future, make sure there is some guidance on what it all means and how it is implemented.

Our June 23rd CASTL was held online only with the main theme of "Open Meetings Act Refresher" with Scott Childers as the presenter. Andrew Sherman, known widely as "Sherm", also introduced us to his role at the NLC working on technical matters. He is happy to work with libraries to ensure their technology needs are met.

State statute requires that public policy is done in a transparent and public manner. All government entities, including governing and advisory library boards must give reasonable advance notice if their meetings. A rule of thumb is 10 days, but local ordinance or practice may differ. In communities under 5,000, library boards can put a notice in a newspaper or post a physical notice in three different locations in the community. If you are larger than 5,000, notice must be placed in a newspaper that covers the community. Locations of where and when the notices were placed should be recorded in the minutes.

The notice should include the time and place of the meeting and an agenda of the meeting (or a location where the agenda can be viewed in person). The agenda can be changed up to 24 hours before the meeting. It must have enough detail so citizens can understand what topic is being discussed. Cities of first class and larger must place the agenda no later than 24 hrs. before the start of the meeting on the website and it must continue to be available for at least 6 months. The website does not count as one of the three physical locations for posting.

Emergency meetings may be held without reasonable public notice. The reason shall be stated in the minutes. Complete minutes of the emergency meeting shall be made available to the public no longer than the next regular business day.

The public has the right to attend, record, and make comments. A board can create rules such as setting time limits on comments. They can require someone to disclose their name and address. It is fine to have some meetings without time for public comment, but a board shouldn't go a long time without time for comment. More information can be found in the recording and Scott's slides.



## Book Club Spotlight – Sitting Pretty by Rebekah Taussig

Sitting Pretty is a memoir in essays focusing on Dr. Taussig's experience as she navigates the world in her disabled body. When Taussig was four months old, cancer attacked her spine, leaving her paralyzed from the waist down. By age two, Taussig is cancer-free and going about her life as any other kid would; only after noticing how disabled people were portrayed in media and movies (The Hunchback of Notre Dame, Forrest Gump, etc.) did she realize she was different. Seeing how disabilities were represented, mocked, and othered, she learned to resent her body and the special accommodations it needed. Throughout her life, Taussig has had to work immensely hard to unlearn all the negatives she was taught about her body and handle people treating her differently because of her disability, from teaching her first class to navigating how strangers want to comment on her love life.



While Taussig's knowledge and ideas

come from a place of well-researched and thoughtful academia, her language and ideas are accessible to anyone and show a nuanced approach to the societal "otherness" placed on disabled people. Group discussion will benefit from being able to talk about these themes together and share their own experiences with disabilities, the disability community, or any moment of "otherness" felt from inaccessibility or social stigma.


