



Do Your Policies Work?

When is the last time your library board reviewed your library's policies? When did you last refer to your library's policies? Was it in a moment of stress when you needed the policies for support? If so, were they current and relevant, and was the information easy to find? Policies are often back-burner projects, as they are not usually the most fun or glamorous aspects of librarianship. However, they are the backbone of everything that the library does.

Policies establish the "why" and "what" behind decisions. This is unlike procedures, which explain "how" tasks are completed. Policies should reflect the mission of the library, and they guide the staff and board as a framework for decision-making in daily operations. Well-written policies help ensure consistency, as they establish processes to be followed for all people and situations. This foundation allows staff to operate fairly and reduces confusion.

The Nebraska Library Commission has some information and documents that may be helpful when establishing policies. The Library Policy [Basic Skills class](#) can be taken by anyone in Nebraska, and it can provide some helpful tools for writing and maintaining helpful policies. The [Public Library Director's Guidebook](#) has a great section about Policies & Procedures. This includes examples of policies and tips on how to develop and write policies. Chapter three of the [Nebraska Library Board Manual](#) offers terrific information for library boards to help understand their role in establishing policies and the importance of keeping them up to date.

Libraries have the opportunity to reapply for accreditation every five years. One important step of the application asks if the library "Has library board policies that address topics necessary for the successful functioning of the library." This application offers one point for each policy written, revised, or reviewed by the library within the last three years. There is a list of many potential topics, and there is a place to list other topics, as it is impossible to limit what policies a library may need. This requirement underscores the importance of regularly reviewing and revising policies.

I am sure this process is done differently by every library and library board. Some may tackle the entire project at one time. Others may update a policy or two at each meeting, rotating them throughout the year. It is common for this process to be done only when accreditation is looming near to earn those points. That reactive approach is understandable, but it rarely produces strong, current policy for effective library governance.

Strong policies are not built all at once, and they are not meant to sit untouched on a shelf. They are living tools that support daily decisions, protect staff, and ensure consistent, fair library service. When policies are treated as ongoing work rather than occasional paperwork, they become one of the most reliable strengths a library has.

Bellevue Public Library Adult Library Program Kickoff

Under clear, sunny skies, families and adults gathered on the library lawn to enjoy an afternoon filled with live music from Blues Agent, a variety of food trucks, and engaging activities for all ages.

Guests explored activity tables hosted by local businesses and community partners, while children and families enjoyed attractions like the bounce house, emergency vehicles, and a selfie station. Bellevue University's Founding Futures

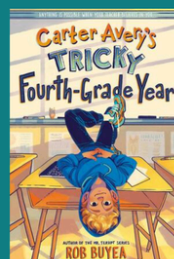
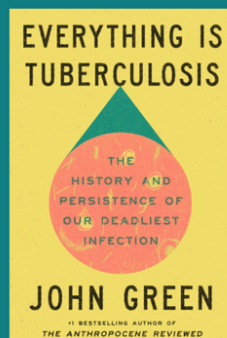
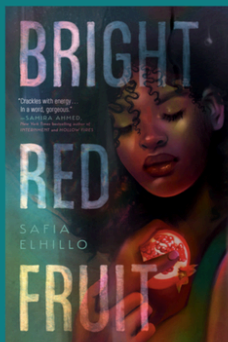

Scholarship Experiences

Nebraska Library Association Conference

This was my first year attending the Nebraska Library Association conference, thanks in large part to the Three Rivers Library System CE scholarship! As a somewhat new library director, this conference was a great way to meet other librarians and gain valuable information. Because I received this scholarship, I was able to attend the pre-conference Levitt Library Open House on Tuesday and learn about new technologies and equipment possibilities in libraries, then head over to Kilgore Library for networking with other librarians in a relaxed atmosphere.

There was such a great selection of sessions to choose from at the conference that I had difficulty deciding which to attend for each time slot, and wished I could be in more than one place at a time! For Day 1 I chose the Bookstagram session, followed by Tweens and Teens – How to keep them coming back, Patron and Staff Wellbeing, Passive Programming ideas, Weeding a collection, and Meeting patron needs with Bibliometrics. All of these sessions were extremely helpful, but my personal favorite was getting so many creative ideas to implement in our library for the tweens and teens in the community.

One fun and memorable incident happened during a session break while waiting to listen to our keynote speaker. I had been so busy deciding what sessions to attend and networking that I didn't check in advance who was speaking at the keynote sessions in the main conference room. I took a random seat at one of the tables and asked the guy next to me if he knew anything about the speaker due to talk in a few minutes. To my amazement and delight, he told me that he was the speaker and slightly nervous—and he was Allen Eskens, bestselling author of *The Life We Bury*, *The Quiet Librarian*, and many other fabulous novels. I am a huge fan of his work, so meeting Allen Eskens in person was the equivalent—for an avid reader and librarian such as myself—to a teenager meeting their favorite rock star. We chatted for awhile and I dared to ask him for a selfie, which he readily agreed to. Allen was very down to earth, funny, and a genuinely interesting person. He gave an eloquent but relatable talk about his years in school, how he had not been much of a reader, and how difficult it had been to get published before he was a well-known writer.

On Thursday, I attended a session about Navigating Space in the Library, followed by Hiring Outside Presenters, Navigating Patron Behavior, and Generative AI for Learning and Reading. The first session about navigating space in the library was hosted by BVH Architecture, and it caused me to re-think our current children's section setup in addition to adding a maker's space. Although our library is small, the space is versatile and the session got my creative juices flowing to think outside the box to maximize our space, furnishings, and during the Exhibitor Break I spoke with a vendor about solutions for our bottom shelves.

During the patron behavior session, it was interesting to hear policies from other libraries and how challenges are handled. Workshop Presenter and Edu-trainer Will Stuck (who was a librarian for many years) gave a powerful keynote speech about the role of the library within the community, and the ways in which libraries bring services that no one else has. He urged us to reach out to our communities and to be a part of the community rather than just a place in the community.

There were more memorable speakers and experiences than I've described here, but the experience was educational, enjoyable, and left me with renewed energy to implement new and practical ideas into our library. Thank you, Trails, for making this experience possible for me!

Humanity Nebraska Event

The crowd was so glad to see that the two “girls” returned for the program.

The program was scheduled for after the monthly senior center birthday and anniversary meal. This event usually is the best-attended meal of the month, and it proved to be the best attended meal in many months.

Nebraska is such a small world. Holtz and Zalud were raised in nearby Ord, playing in bands in their younger days. Alice Holtz, who displayed the visual photos to accompany the songs, grew up in nearby Elgin, and was joined at the program by two sisters and a brother-in-law. Some of the audience members remembered the guests from much earlier (as in high school) days.

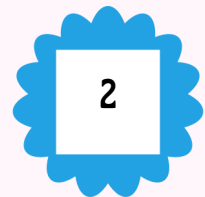


United for Libraries Tools for Trustees
