

Positive Attitude: Murphy Meets Pollyanna

Is everyone familiar with the phrase "Murphy's Law?" It was interesting to learn that the original quote by Captain Edward Murphy was actually "If there's any way these guys can do it wrong, they will." This was in response to a failed experiment for the Air Force. Gauges had been wired backward by a company in Dayton, Ohio, so there were no readings available following an intense experiment. When Lieutenant Colonel John Stapp was interviewed by a reporter, his response was that the crew operated under "Murphy's Law, if anything can go wrong, it will." Prior to that quote, Stapp had coined "Stapp's Law, the universal aptitude for ineptitude makes any human accomplishment an incredible miracle." (Stilwell, n.d.) To me, this is incredibly negative and sounds like a complete lack of faith in people! However, there is an element of truth here, as everyone has had the experience of things going wrong.

An example of something going wrong happened with the recent bus trip to the Association of Rural and Small Libraries conference in Wichita, Kansas. I had planned far in advance for a "party bus" to deliver librarians to the hotel for the conference, and then a different bus from the same company would return to pick us up. What could possibly go wrong? Well, my mind conjured up all kinds of possibilities: a flat tire, an accident, forgetting someone's luggage, forgetting a librarian, the bus driver forgetting to deliver us to Kansas, the bus driver forgetting to pick us up in Kansas – you get the idea. I worried about Murphy's Law being a real thing.

The trip there went smoothly. The bus driver was a bit late in picking us up, but we soon learned he was on the way, and it was not cause for panic. The trip was fun, the conversation was lively, the bus echoed with laughter, and memories were created. When it was time to return home, the bus arrived in plenty of time, and everyone was packed and eager to get back to Nebraska.

Unfortunately, we did not escape Murphy's Law. We were nearing the Nebraska border when the smell of diesel permeated the bus. It steadily got worse, and the driver pulled over at a park near Chester, Nebraska. Everyone got out of the bus to breathe in the fresh air. Librarians found some shady locations to wait while the bus driver speculated how to deal with this unexpected situation.

After only a few minutes of waiting, conversations turned to the available food and water supply. It was so refreshing to hear comments about the nice weather and how fortunate we were to be stranded in a park rather than on the side of the road somewhere. Despite the concern about how to get back home, everyone stayed upbeat and positive, and it was pleasant to hear laughter. I am so grateful to have experienced this Pollyanna attitude, as it helped turn a negative circumstance into a positive adventure.

The local sheriff arrived, and the sheriff and bus driver were able to arrange our travel back home on a school bus. While this did not follow plans, the positivity of the librarians was inspiring, and I will forever cherish the memories we shared on our party bus trip to Wichita!


It's me again, your ever-present local office gremlin and book kit hoarder. Guess what? We've got a ton of book kits appearing in our office again. Between buying new titles and donations being dropped off, I'm drowning in towers of book kits. It's a fun problem to have, but I find myself hoping that a second dimension filled with bookshelves will appear when I open a closet door. In the month of September we added sixteen new titles. Add that to the ten new titles we added in August and the eight new titles from July and let's just say it's a wonder I still have desk space.


We're starting a new partnership with <u>Nebraska Public Media</u> where they've donated <u>ten copies of Great</u> <u>Plains Bison</u> by Dan O'Brien. They've put together discussion questions and additional resources for you to access. You can also watch <u>Seed Warriors</u> with your book club, which is about a group of seed keepers in their ancestral homelands of Nebraska as they seek to regain sovereignty over the food system. I'm excited about this partnership as I think knowledge is power and the more we learn the better we become.

So, on the topic of new book kits, I wanted to run through a mini tutorial. You can find all our titles, number of copies, and whether they're currently checked in/out on our website https://www.libib.com/u/trails. On the left hand side you can choose which shelf you want to peruse Book Kits or STEAM Kits. On the right hand side of the page is an orange filter button which will pop open all of our tags. You can tick a box to find any titles with that descriptor or on the main page under the book title there are orange buttons with descriptor words. If you click on one of those it will bring up all the titles in our collection with that descriptor. So, for instance, if your book club has decided on the theme mystery for the next selection, you can click on 'mystery' in the filters and see all what we have to offer on that theme.

Once you decide on a title, you can place items on hold where I'll email you about specifics or just email me directly at trls.assistant@gmail.com and let me know what title and how many copies you'll need by a certain date. Then I can check the calendar and make double sure that the timeframe works. We've got book kits scheduled out through April 2024, so I can't promise every timeframe will work, but I'm happy to do whatever I can to get as close as possible. We typically lend out titles for about six weeks, but if you need extra time, just let me know. If no one else has requested that title I'm happy to extend the due date.

So if you're reading this and already fretting about pickups/drop-offs not to worry! We can mail out each book kit and in the box we include prepaid UPS shipping label. So that means that there's no cost to the librarians or media specialists in our region. When you're done just repackage up the kit in any plain box and hand it off to your local UPS driver. We've really tried to streamline our process but if you have any questions I'm always available to chat about it.

Halloween Breakout Box Challenge



NLC Book Club Spotlight

Book Club Spotlight:

The Ordinary Spaceman: From Boyhood Dreams to Astronaut

Mackenzie Marrow is the librarian in charge of book clubs at the Nebraska Library Commission and wants to share with everyone the hidden gems in the NLC's Book Club Collection. Below is an excerpt, but to read the full details go to Mackenzie's blog post.

Four years after what would be his final voyage into space, retired astronaut Clayton Anderson of Ashland, Nebraska, released his tell-all memoir of his 30 years at NASA, comprising 167 days living in space, working on the International Space Station and performing nearly 40 hours of spacewalks. Now, when I say this is a "tell-all" memoir, I don't mean it in a way to dramatize or bring to mind a TMZ article. I mean it literally. Because today, our Book Club Spotlight The Ordinary Spaceman, is genuinely one of the most unflinchingly honest, funny, and candid stories about what it takes to be a NASA astronaut. Anderson's insistence on being "an ordinary guy" might feel strange when reading a book by someone who has been to space, but it's also his wholehearted truth.

Clayton and his mother have different ideas about when he decided to be an astronaut. He argues it started with watching the Apollo 8 mission at the age of nine, and his mom, however insists the dream was always apart of him. A proud and true Nebraskan, Clayton made his way to Texas, working at NASA as an engineer, and eventually leading the development effort for the ISS's Caution and Warning System, all the while continuing to pursue his dream of spaceflight. Clayton applied to the astronaut program 15 times before finally being selected, and that was only the beginning. From recalling his first time breaking the sound barrier, freezing during survival training in the Russian wilderness, needing stiches while working in an undersea lab, and tragically witnessing the Columbia disaster alongside the crew's families, Anderson is incredibly open and humble about his experiences during his time in and out of space, even when he finds himself in the wrong. Through stories of incredible isolation and excitement, frustration, and an ever-evolving sense of respect for others, Anderson doesn't hide his emotions in his writing, and takes us through his personal growth as a man, an astronaut, and in his faith.

We had an abundance of teens that were lingering after school but had no real place to go and seemed out of place. We wanted to keep attracting and serving these teens in a way that honored them for who they are and encouraged them to establish good relationships with the library and staff. We had not been able to pre-plan much of the program, but we also knew that we had to act fast so they would continue to come to the library.

We set up a Starbooks teen lounge with coffee, ambient music and video, dimmed lights, coffee and fancy flavorings, snacks, games and books. When we advertised to schools, we made a point of disclosing that this is a place to unwind, safely socialize and get homework help if needed. The program is passive, and the staff is not directly involved in leading any specific programming at this point. The reasoning for this was to give some autonomy to the teens without having more adults dictate their day with plans like they experience at school. In the future, we may add some passive projects, but our focus is on the autonomy aspect.

The results? The kids were relaxed, engaged with staff when we would pop in to restock refreshments and have continued to come visit with YS staff even on days that we don't offer Starbooks. Already this program has done what we hoped... forging relationships with the often-forgotten teen group.

Celebrating International Dot Day at Omaha Public Library

The Dot by Peter H. Reynolds is a moving book about the power of a teacher's words and value of self-expression. In *The Dot*, Vashti is stumped about what to create in art class. She doubts herself and finds it almost impossible to begin. Finally, her teacher suggests, "Just make a mark and see where it takes you." This gentle nudge leads Vashti to explore her creative side. International Dot Day is celebrated every year in September. In 2009, Iowan teacher Terry Shay came up with the idea of Dot Day and began celebrating with his students. Shay gave kids the freedom to express themselves through art by designing a Dot, just like Vashti. What started as a small event has now grown to thousands of participants in over 200 countries! This year, the Dot Day celebration was extra special, as it was the 20th anniversary of the book's publication.

Ten Omaha Public Library branches participated in International Dot Day in September. Children and their families joined in a special storytime, reading The Dot and singing songs about art, colors and shapes. At the conclusion of storytime, families used coffee filters, markers, paint stamps, stickers, dab markers and crayons to make their own Dot. Children were allowed to spray their creations with water to create beautiful color patterns.

We are thrilled by the level of interest from our initial family engagement pilot. We are excited to introduce our November and December theme, Storytelling with *Molly of Denali*. Storytelling with *Molly of Denali* celebrates intergenerational family storytelling with a focus on oral storytelling.

Storytelling with *Molly of Denali* is a storytelling literacy program for children 3-8 and their parents/caregivers. This event will include a movement and music activity to introduce storytelling, a short video from *Molly of Denali: The Big Gathering*, a read-aloud, and hands on activities to support the art of family storytelling, both oral and written.

As a reminder, Nebraska Public Media is piloting a family engagement program with libraries of all sizes. Humanities Nebraska: Jeff Barnes

Sarpy county is a diverse community and encompasses Bellevue community, Offutt Air Force Base, and surrounding areas. Bellevue is Nebraska's Oldest City. The settlement of Nebraska began with a fur trading post established in 1822 by Joshua Pilcher. The post served as a central trading point with local Omaha, Otoe, Missouri and Pawnee tribes. Early French American fur trappers named the area Belle Vue because of the beautiful view seen from the bluffs overlooking the Missouri River. Bellevue, Nebraska is ideally located next to the Missouri River and the following cities; Sioux City, Iowa, and Omaha, Nebraska. The Bellevue Public Library, transforming lives for 94 years, offers a variety of printed, audiovisual and computer-related resources and programs for all ages. Originally begun in 1929, the Library has been at its current location since 1975.

Each August Bellevue, Nebraska hosts its annual Arrows to Aerospace Celebration. This year (2023) marks the 35th year that the Bellevue-Offutt Kiwanis Club will be the proud sponsor of Arrows to Aerospace, Bellevue's premier community celebration. This Humanities Nebraska event will showcase the popular presenter and author Jeff Barnes and will be held at 6:30pm on Wednesday August 16 at the Bellevue Public Library as a midweek kickoff to the 52nd Annual Arrows to Aerospace celebration held August 17-19, 2023. Friday features a lunch at the Bellevue Senior Center.

The Arrows to Aerospace (or Bellevue Days) celebration features a parade at 10am on Saturday, pancake breakfast, free pony rides, bounce houses, music, and a variety of both non-profit and retail vendors, activities for children, entertainment, food, and fun! With over 125 entries the highlight of the celebration is the Grand Parade. The parade begins at Mission Avenue and Bert Murphy, continues east on Mission, then north on Franklin, ending at Washington Park with activities to enjoy for the whole family after the parade until 3pm in Olde Towne Bellevue.

Jeff Barnes will be presenting his newest offering "The 'Mad' Queen of the Prairies: The Frenzied First Years of the Nebraska Territory, 1854-1859" as a lead-in to the celebration of Arrows to Aerospace to provide an entertaining and educational program for our Bellevue community as we celebrate our heritage.

Bellevue Public Library has a long history of partnering with Kiwanis and the Arrows to Aerospace celebration, the third weekend in August each year, is one of their biggest events. Last year Jeff Barnes presented Contact and Conflict: the monumental story of Nebraska and the Indian Wars. The year before, for the 50th Annual Arrows to Aerospace Celebration, the Bellevue Public Library hosted the History of Nebraska as Told by Peter Sarpy Featuring Darrel Draper.
