## Pinterest—Social Networking with a Practical Purpose

Have you ever seen a recipe, a craft, or a program idea on the Internet and wished you had someplace to save it without having to print it out for your files? (Because, let's face it, you know that even if you get it filed, you will not remember that you have it.) If the answer is yes, Pinterest is the site for you! Pinterest is a social networking site that allows members to create and organize online bulletin boards.

Librarians and teachers have found many practical uses for Pinterest. It is easy to create Boards to promote new materials by pinning covers and book trailers; to suggest resources for class projects; to gather purchase requests from students and patrons; and, to feature quotations about reading. After hearing about Pinterest from Amy Mather, the Manager of Adult Programs and Lifelong Learning for Omaha Public Library, I decided to set up an account for RVLS. I have a Board for Book Trailers, one with ideas to celebrate Dr. Seuss's Birthday on March 2<sup>nd</sup>, another with craft projects related to the Summer Reading program, and several more.

Joining is easy. Originally, if you wanted to become a member, someone had to issue an invitation. Now, you go to [www.pinterest.com](http://www.pinterest.com) and select the "Join Pinterest" button at the top of the page. You can register via Facebook, Twitter, or an email address. Enter some basic information and you are ready to start pinning. All you need to figure out is how many Boards you want. Here are some ideas:

Pin book covers to attract readers to books they might not otherwise find.

Create reading lists.

Gather research information on a collaborative board.

Collect ideas for library displays.

Show off pictures of your local community.

Share craft projects and recipes.




Central City Public Library, which is located in central Nebraska, developed a popular program with their Pinterest site. Every month, the library hosts a Pinterest Party. Staff members pin interesting crafts and recipes to the account. One idea is chosen and a message is posted letting patrons know what the project is, and what materials they should bring to the party. Since the participants bring their own supplies, the class cost is very low—usually around \$1.00.

At one point, there were concerns about copyright. Pinterest has addressed this by providing the source-link for images automatically. They also offer an online complaint form for anyone who believes their copyright has been infringed.

There are many practical reasons for establishing a Pinterest account: connecting with your students and patrons, collaborating with your coworkers, organizing ideas without paper, but best of all...its fun. Go to the RVLS website to follow me on Pinterest.

## Today's Libraries Connect (E-)Readers but Face Roadblocks

Nook. Kindle. iPad. Your local library. You've heard of all of these and you know that all four deliver digital content. But, according to the Pew Internet Project, most people don't know that U.S. public libraries provide ebooks and other digital resources. They are unaware of the fact that today's libraries offer books in a variety of formats—and so much more! Our Nebraska libraries continue to change and offer new services and programs to meet the ever-changing needs of our communities. The number of Nebraska public libraries offering e-books has more than doubled in the last two years, with fifty percent now offering the service. This is just the latest chapter in the story of our commitment to reading, knowledge, imagination, and lifelong learning for all Nebraskans.

Libraries help readers find authors, and authors find readers. We do this by selecting locally relevant materials, and through programs like One Book One Nebraska, as well as other collaborations with authors and publishers. Libraries also are engaged in growing and supporting the next generations of readers – encouraging children and young adults to read for fun and for success in school and life. But libraries face roadblocks. For the first time ever, we are barred from purchasing some materials our communities deserve. Right now, several of the largest trade publishers (known as “the Big Six”) refuse to sell e-books to public libraries. As a result, Nebraskans are not getting a fair deal. If our libraries' digital bookshelves mirrored the *New York Times* fiction bestseller list, we would be missing half of our collection on any given week due to these publishers' policies.

On the other hand, other publishers – including hundreds of smaller, independent presses and a rising tide of self-published authors – do understand the value of placing books in libraries. A recent report from *Library Journal* found that more than half of all library users report purchasing books by an author they discovered through the library. Publishing is not just another industry. It has special and important significance to society. Libraries complement and actively support this industry by supporting literacy and seeking to spread an infectious and lifelong love of reading and learning. Library lending encourages sampling new authors, topics, and genres. This experimentation stimulates the market for books, with the library serving as a discovery, promotion, and awareness service for authors and publishers. Every publisher must allow libraries to lend e-books so libraries can continue to work toward the mission of access for all.

But even if the publishers change their policies tomorrow, Nebraska libraries would have difficulty accessing the local funds to purchase all the ebooks and audio books that library customers need. Library customer demand continues to outpace supply. To address this, the Nebraska Library Commission has requested direct

state funding to expand ebook and audio book borrowing access for Nebraskans. With an investment of less than 50 cents per person, Nebraskans can be assured that local libraries will do their best to continue their commitment to reading, knowledge, imagination, and lifelong learning for all Nebraskans. ## Public Libraries Invited to Apply for Internship Grants

Applications due Feb. 15, 2013

The Nebraska Library Commission's *Cultivating Rural Librarians' Technology Skills* program offers support for internships through grants to accredited public libraries. In partnership with the Nebraska Library Association and funded through a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program, the internship grants increase awareness about library professions and education and the opportunities for employment in Nebraska libraries.


### So, what can your library do with the internship program?

- Share your enthusiasm for library education and the library profession
- Expand your programming
- Bring in fresh faces
- Show interns what happens behind-the-scenes
- Partner with other library types to show the variety of work settings

Internship grants range from \$500 to \$1,000. A library may provide one 100-hour internship during the summer months that might last eight weeks, or two 50-hour internships during the school year that might last ten weeks, depending on the needs of the library and the scheduling needs and qualifications of the internship candidates. Library grantees will recruit, select, and hire their interns. Usually, interns are hired as contract workers and paid on a stipend rather than an hourly wage, but the terms of employment are determined by the library's governing body. Interns provide valuable assistance with library service activities and local library programming. Library staff help introduce interns to the joys of library service careers. Partnership projects involving collaboration between a public library and another type of library will be given special consideration.

Heat in microwave for 1 minute.






### Ezra Jack Keats Minigrant Program for Public Libraries and Public Schools

Public education is one of the greatest legacies of our country, one that benefits children from every walk of life. For Keats, it was at public school that he received his greatest encouragement to pursue his vocation as an artist. And the public library was a haven that introduced him to the wonders of art history.

To offer a similar experience to new generations, the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation created a funding initiative called Minigrants, through which awards of \$500 are given to public schools and public libraries for projects that foster creative expression, working together and interaction with a diverse community. They also represent an opportunity for educators, whose efforts are often inadequately funded or recognized, to create special activities outside the standard curriculum and make time to encourage their students.

## Term Limits for Library Boards

Many boards find that setting term limits can be beneficial.

### Advantages of a Term Limit Policy

Bringing diversity onto the board is easier.

The board has a built-in balance of continuity and turnover.

Passive, ineffective, or troublesome board members can be more easily rotated off.

The board has the possibility of working with active community members who can devote only a few years to board service.

Board members experience a better rotation of committee assignments.

A regular infusion of fresh ideas and new perspectives is brought onto the board.

The board gains a regular awareness and pays attention to the changing group dynamics.

Limits present an opportunity for the board and the retiring board member to reassess a mutual willingness to continue working together with the possibility of enlarging the circle of committed supporters by keeping retired board members involved.

### Disadvantages of Term Limits

The loss of expertise and organizational memory.

The board spends more time dedicated to recruitment and orientation.

Additional efforts are needed to keep the group cohesive.

### Disadvantages of Not Having Term Limits

Stagnation if no change occurs among the board members.

Perpetual concentration of power within a small group.

Intimidation of the occasional new member.

Tiredness, boredom, and loss of commitment by the board.

Loss of connection to the constituency due to a change in demographics or environmental factors.



## Flu Preparedness



The online version of *American Libraries*, the magazine of the American Library Association, regularly publishes a column titled, "Ask the ALA Librarian." Recently, a library staff member asked the following question:

One of our regular library visitors asked about the library's plan for preventing the spread of the flu. He asked whether we wipe down the books daily or otherwise clean them to prevent transmission. Does the ALA have information to help libraries on this subject?

The answer is that ALA generally leaves detailed guidelines to the individual libraries and their communities. However, according to an official at the Illinois Department of Public Health, "Books do not need to be wiped down and books will not cause flu. Almost all flu is passed directly from person to person through droplets such as when someone sneezes and coughs on you." He also provided the 3 C's for prevention:

- Clean – Encourage people to wash their hand frequently, in the bathroom and before eating.
- Cover – Encourage people to cover their coughs.
- Contain – Don't go to the library or anywhere else if you are sick.

According to Dr. James M. Steckelberg on the Mayo Clinic website, "It's easy to catch the flu or a cold from rubbing your nose after handling an object an infected person sneezed on a few moments ago. But personal contact with an infected person—a handshake, for example—is the most common way these germs spread.



# Week of Weeding




**The Republican Valley Library System is declaring March 4-8, 2013, a “Week of Weeding”!**
